

Our Digital Leaders asked their classmates to mind their devices. They gave some tips on best practice.


- 1. Make sure your hands are clean and dry before you take an iPad.

Our iPads are being used every day by more than 150 students in our school. It is very important that everyone works together to use them safely. Classes were asked to remember to follow all the guidelines on the yellow poster they have posted in each class.

*The school askes Parents to monitor their children's activity on their devices at home. Some of the content being brought to our attention, the children exposed to this, how many of them exposed and their ages is beyond belief. Guard Niall's broad experience in this area is alarming. Many of these sites are extremely innocent on the face of it and many are getting past the safesearch type tools that Parents think are doing the monitoring for them.
